

WHY IS THE SKY BLUE?

The sun's rays appear to be clear or white in colour. In reality, they are made up of all the colours of the rainbow. The sun's rays pass through the barrier of the atmosphere that surrounds Earth where they are absorbed by molecules of gas and water. These molecules 'give off' the colour they absorb. The blue colour in the sun's rays is the colour that is absorbed the fastest, and so it is the colour that we see when we look up at the sky on a sunny day.

WHY IS BLOOD RED?

Blood is made up of four parts: plasma, white blood cells, platelets and red blood cells. Plasma helps you grow and gives you energy. White blood cells fight germs and infections. Platelets help form blood clots to stop bleeding. Red blood cells carry oxygen to every part of your body. The oxygen and iron in red blood cells give blood its red colour.

WHY ARE LEAVES GREEN?

The leaves of trees and plants make their food using sunlight. This is called photosynthesis. Without photosynthesis there would be no plants on Earth. Without plants there would be no animals and no humans! Leaves contain a chemical called chlorophyll which allows them to turn sunlight into food using photosynthesis. Chlorophyll is a pigment that gives leaves their green colour.




